Introduction

ABOUT THE PROCESS

In February 2022, Park County launched the first major update of its Land Use Plan since 1998. The processcalled Plan Park County—is an opportunity for all Park County residents, business and property owners, and other community stakeholders to help shape Park County's future. The updated Land Use Plan will establish an overarching vision and goals for Park County, as well as the policy foundation that will guide where and how Park County grows in the future—generally, as well as within individual Planning Areas. The County will implement land use guidance established during the Plan Park County process through subsequent updates to the County's Development Regulations.

ROLE OF THE PUBLIC INVOLVEMENT PLAN

Community and stakeholder input are critical to the success of the Plan Park County process. The County will offer opportunities for the public to provide input throughout the process, as outlined in this Public Involvement Plan (PIP). Overarching objectives for the process are to:

- Establish (and maintain) open lines of communication;
- Provide broad and inclusive opportunities for engagement; and
- Foster leadership and collaboration.

Information contained in this PIP will serve as a reference during the course of the process and may evolve. The sections that follow include: 1) an overview of the steps in the Plan Park County process; 2) a list of community stakeholders; 3) an overview of the formal groups that will be engaged during the process; 4) a communications strategy to help get the word out about the process and various input opportunities; 5) a calendar of anticipated events and input opportunities by phase.

FORMAL GROUP ENGAGEMENT

Core Planning Team

The project team will work closely with a core team comprised of two representatives of the Park County Board of County Commissioners and key staff from the Planning and Zoning Department. The core team will assist with overall project coordination and scheduling on a day-to-day basis, and review and provide input on interim drafts and technical data as necessary to help guide the Plan Park County process. The core team will meet with the project team bi-weekly, or as needed, throughout the process.

Elected and Appointed Officials

On a regular basis throughout the process, project team members will hold joint meetings with the Board of County Commissioners and County Planning and Zoning Commission to share project updates, present preliminary findings and alternative solutions, and solicit input on key policy choices. These meetings will occur virtually and/or in-person. In-person meetings will generally coincide with major project milestones. Board and Commission updates will also serve as a forum to keep the community at large informed about the Plan Park County process. Land Use Plan Advisory Committee (LUPAC)

The Board will appoint 15 members to serve on the Land Use Plan Advisory Committee (LUPAC). The LUPAC will represent different communities, geographies, and interests within Park County and assist in the development of the updated Land Use Plan. LUPAC members will provide citizen perspectives and input on interim work products, assist with community and stakeholder engagement by helping to get the word out, and generally serve as community ambassadors for the Land Use Plan process. This group will meet four times during the process—generally corresponding to each "round" of community engagement—to weigh in on shared values, vision, and policy directions. Technical Working Group (TWG)
